#### Tips for finding Scholarships, Bursaries and Grants

**Scholarships** – Awards for merit or involvement in areas such as: academic, leadership, community involvement, athletics, clubs, associations, employers and interests

Grants and Bursaries – Awarded based on finanical need or specific criteria

You miss out on 100% of the scholarship, grant or bursary money you do not apply for! Applications can take anywhere from a few minutes to hours to complete, but the process starts long before sitting down to apply.

Over the years we have seen a shift in scholarships, moving towards community involvement, leadership and strong personal character.

To help get you started, here are a few questions:

- 1. Extra curricular activites: what do you do inside and outside school?
- 2. Do you have a part time job?
- 3. Where do your parents work?
- 4. Where do or did your grandparents work?
- 5. Are your parents or grandparents involved in community organizations?
- 6. Do you volunteer or participate in a leadership role?
- 7. How are your grades?
- 8. Have you selected and applied to Post-Secondary insitutions?
  - a. What scholarships are offered?
  - b. Do they have individual applications or automatic?
- 9. What scholarships are offered at your high school?
- 10. Do you know the local (Community Based) scholarships?

Once you have answered these questions the fun begins, time to start your search.

#### Tips on Filling Out a Successful Application

- 1. Now that you have a list of Scholarships:
  - a. Organze the applications by closing dates and time
  - b. Create your "To Do" list and schedule
  - c. Collect supporting documents

#### 2. Collecting your documents:

- a. Transcripts request your sealed transcript through your MyPass account
- b. Acceptance letter this will be emailed to you after you accept your offer from the postseconday institution
- c. References ask your references early so they have time to write the best support letter for you. Some applications will only require name and contact information for your reference, please communicate with your references regularly about your applications
- d. Financial documents in some cases you will be asked to include personal of family income details such as your line 150 of the most recent tax return
- e. Proof of participation certificates, employment records, membership fees/dues, letter from organization
- f. Essays students tend to avoid these, however you have an amazing support system to help you write these Ask for help: Parents, Teachers, Counsellors

#### 3. Selecting References:

- The best references are the people who believe in you the most, can identify your strengths and personal characteristics (teachers, coaches, employers or volunteer coordinator, group leaders)
- b. Ask for support early, respect their time
- c. Confirm correct spelling of their name and contact information
- d. Ask for multiple signed copies of reference letters, copies are okay with original signature
- 4. Read the application instructions:
  - a. Identify the requirements, key words and organization details
- 5. Research, research; who is offering the award and why?
  - a. The details will help you answer the scholarship questions or essay if needed
- 6. You have applied, now what are the key details:
  - a. Selection dates or announcement dates
  - b. How and when are the funds distributed
- 7. When you win, let us know. We want to celebrate with you.
- 8. In gratitude, please send thank you notes for all awards you recieve

#### **Requesting Reference Letters**

- Provide them with a Personal Profile, even if they know you, provide them with highlights:
  - Unique characteristics and strengths
  - Involvement incommunity service, clubs, teams or organizations
  - Hobbies and interests

- Accomplishments
- Awards and prizes
- Academic standing
- Work history
- Allow sufficient time (2 -3 weeks) for letters of recommendation or reference letters.

#### **Writing a Personal Application Letter or Essay**

- Make a list of key points/keywords that need to be covered
- Write an outline or rough draft
- Get to know your audience, who are they? Do they offer tips on their website?
- If there are no specific requirements for an essay or letter, you should consider the following:
  - o Personal reflection: how a specific subject has influenced you
  - Outline of your interests, hobbies and activities
  - Summarize community involvement and leadership
  - Employment history and volunteer work
- Letters and essays, unless specifically instructed to present hand written, are typed, double spaced and only printed on one side. If you are submitting the document electronically it will need to be a PDF
- Don't assume that a committee will read between the lines. If you have done something noteworthy, include it. Most scholarships will have many worthy candidates. The better job you do of selling yourself, the better your chances are of receiving a scholarship or award
- Edit edit edit!
- Ask for help: proof readers, teachers or somone who has excellent writing skills.
